


SUNDAY REFLECTION

Today is Palm Sunday - the beginning of our Holy Week, Our liturgy starts with the account of Jesus humbly entering into Jerusalem riding a donkey. People put cloaks and palm branches in His pathway crying. "Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" It is with great joy that Christ was being honored as king, still in the same breath, we are filled with sorrow as we reflect on Christ's passion and death. Thankfully, we know the glorious outcome of this painful journey. Today, as we read about the climax of Christ's mission here on earth, we are reminded that He is the Perfect Steward, a model for us all on our stewardship journey.

Our First Reading, from the prophet Isaiah, portrays a suffering servant. The suffering servant, in may ways, foreshadows what Jesus endured during His passion - "I gave my back to those who beat me...my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting." Christ endured such tortures, knowing that He did not deserve them, but still He humbly submitted to them.

As we embark on this Holy Week, let us take some time to reflect on the life of Christ as He is our model Steward, and may we strive to imitate Him daily.

As Catholics, how do we prepare and participate in the sacrifice of the Holy Mass?

- 1. Preparation begins at home. You MUST fast one hour prior to receiving communion. This includes food, candy, gum etc. The only thing that may be consumed within the hour prior to Mass is medication and water. You should not approach the altar with candy or gum in your mouth.
- 2. Arrive on time! We all run late at times but when we consistently run late, we have a problem. A study recently revealed that over 30 percent of people come late to Mass. From a statistical perspective, the high rate indicates habit.

Reasons vary, of course. We have become so familiar with the Mass that we've grown casual about it.

The whole Mass is the perfect worship of God. Arrive in time to invoke the Holy Spirit to help you participate worthily.

- 3. Genuflect before entering the pew. We genuflect on the right knee. If you're unable to genuflect a profound bow is suitable.
- 4. Maintain reverent silence and subdued speech. Upon entering a church, greeting family and friends is customary. We smile, say good morning under our breath and so on. There is always room for such courtesies. But there is a problem when we hear a crescendo of chit-chatting, oblivious to the tabernacle and people praying.
- 5. Vocalize the responses in rhythm. During Mass we vocalize a conversation with God. With every ritual, maintaining attention is difficult. So, it helps when we correctly and humbly respond (e.g. "And with your spirit"). If our lips are closed when we're supposed to vocalize prayer, the silence indicates that our minds are probably distracted. The prayers should be in unison. Please do not push or race through the prayers.
- 6. Listen attentively during the readings. The General Instructions of the Roman Missal indicate "When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel. Therefore, the readings from the Word of God are to be *listened to reverently* by everyone, for they are an element of the greatest importance in the Liturgy. Note it says listen and not read. You cannot be focused on the word of God while you're turning pages and reading instead of listening and being attentive.
- 7. Control your children. Every parent knows that controlling a riotous baby is tricky. There's a difference between a child chirping and a temper tantrum. Be considerate of those around you who may be affected in their worship by your child's behavior.
- 8. Focus on the consecration. The consecration of the Mass is the central sacred event. The ringing of the bells wakes us from our slumber and reminds us to pay attention to our Lord's return, his real presence under the appearance of bread and wine, and His holy cross sacrifice.
- 9. Recite the Lord's prayer with devotion. Jesus speaks to us directly and personally during the Our Father. We place his words on our lips. The Lord's prayer is the perfect prayer because Jesus crafted it.
- 10. Before communion, focus on the words of John the Baptist. When the priest raises the host and directs us to "Behold the Lamb of God," all activity should stop. Gaze upon the host with devotion. Do not use the sacred moment as a distraction to rush to the lavatories. Even the ushers bend a knee.
- 11. Approach Communion with reverence. Focus on the miracle you are about to receive.
- 12. Receive Communion with devotion. If you are receiving on the tongue, stick your tongue out so the priest has a solid surface for our Lord to rest on. Don't just open your mouth and expect the priest to insert our Lord like it's a slot machine. Don't lunge your head forward, just stand with your mouth open and tongue out. If you're receiving on your hand, place one hand on top of the other and hold your hands in front of your chest. You do not need to elevate your hands to the priest. Do not grab the host, do not place a finger on it. Consume the host while you're standing in front of the priest. Do not walk away with the Lord in your hands. Do not cup your hands, again lay them flat. If you're touching the Ciborium, you are too close to the priest. You don't need to thrust your hands forward, keep them in front of your chest. "Amen" is the appropriate response. Receive reverently, remember you are receiving our Lord and Savior, He is truly present in what you are receiving.
- 13. Remain at Mass until the Mass is concluded when the priest processes to the back of the Church.
